

Relocation Guide: Moving to the Las Vegas Valley

Choosing a side of the valley

Commute time varies meaningfully across the valley — southwest and northwest communities can run 20-30 minutes from the Strip, while west-valley neighborhoods like The Lakes or Spanish Trail sit much closer. Start your search by anchoring to where you'll actually spend your time day to day.

Cost of living basics

Nevada has no state income tax, which is a genuine draw for many relocating households, though property tax, insurance, and utility costs (especially summer air conditioning) should be budgeted for realistically rather than assumed away.

School considerations

Most of the valley is served by the Clark County School District, with ratings varying meaningfully by specific school and neighborhood rather than by city. Henderson and Summerlin generally post some of the district's stronger ratings, but it's worth checking the specific zoned school for any address under consideration.

Climate and desert-specific costs

Summer in the valley is genuinely different from the rest of the year — factor in higher summer electric bills, and expect most HOA landscaping to lean toward xeriscape rather than traditional lawns.

A basic moving checklist

- Get pre-approved (or confirm rental budget) before house-hunting remotely
 - If possible, visit during summer before committing to a neighborhood
 - Set up utilities (power, water, internet) ahead of your move-in date
 - Update your address with the DMV within the required window after establishing residency
 - Research HOA rules for any community before assuming your lifestyle fits
